Telephone Survey Among 300 Registered & Likely Voters across Public Service Commission District Two in Louisiana 70% cell/30% landline

The Louisiana Public Service Commission (PSC), composed of five elected officials representing distinct districts, is actively exploring a full and robust three-phase evaluation of Louisiana's Electricity Market rules—the first in over twenty years. Louisiana's largest utilities have intended to spend billions building new power plants, which would increase customers' bills. The Commission started a three-part study to determine if there are smarter and more affordable ways to ensure people in Louisiana can get reliable, reasonably priced electricity.

There are opportunities to leverage private sector investments to maintain low electricity costs, empowering Louisiana's energy industry to drive innovation and growth while protecting working families from the financial strain of high utility rates.


Overview

- In the race for PSC District 2, no candidate is near 50%. Democrat Nick LaBorde leads at 34%, Republican Jean-Paul Coussan 28%, and Republican Julie Quinn (17%), and 22% are undecided.
- Near unanimous concern over the rising cost of living, specifically utilities and electricity.
- Vast majority of voters find unfairness in the current system where residents cannot shop for their utilities and having to pay for green energy options even if customers do not want it.
- CHOICE reigns supreme for voters and consumers.
- Majority support new plants being built but want corporate employers and private industry to invest their money in the utility sector if it can help hold down costs for all consumers and think companies who generate their own power should be allowed to sell any excess power they have to other ratepayers, because it would drive down costs for all consumers by reducing the need for utility companies to build new power plants.
- Voters overwhelmingly support and would reward a candidate for this seat who would not stick
 with the status quo, would offer more than one choice in electric provider, would not pass
 renewable energy cost to the consumer, allow private industry pay for renewable energy, and
 promote conservative free market principles.

Consensus Concerned Over Rising Cost of Living

This includes 89% of parents, along with nearly 90% across various racial and age groups, highlighting widespread concern that transcends all education levels.

Essential costs have surged in the past five years, with 91% paying more for groceries, 74% for energy, and 50% for home gas, highlighting widespread financial strain.



Thinking specifically about your electric bill, how concerned are you with the cost of energy in Louisiana?




How familiar would you say you are with the Public Service Commission in Louisiana?

No Candidate Near 50% in District Two Race: Laborde Leads by 6%

In the race for District Two's Public Service Commission seat, Jean-Paul Coussan (R) holds a strong lead among GOP voters (50%), while Democrat Nick Laborde is favored by those concerned with energy costs (31%). Julie Quinn (R) has modest support across various groups, including 18% of women aged 49 and under. However, voter indecision remains high with 26% of Independents still unsure.



Building New Power Plants: Voter Support Strong, but Across Key Cohorts Support is Mixed

Support, even if it raises customer bills, is notably high among men 50+ (71%) and Independents (68%). Women under 49 are more divided, with 57% in favor and 41% opposed. However, opposition is stronger among those with a high school education or less (47% opposed).

Louisiana's largest monopoly utilities are pushing to spend billions of dollars constructing new power plants in the state, stating a need to update the current infrastructure, even if it will increase customers' bills. If not built, outdated facilities will continue to be used. Knowing this, do you support or oppose building new power plants?



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Over Two-Thirds of Louisianans in District 2, Believe It's Unfair to Have No Choice in Electric Providers

About 67% overall find the lack of choice in electric providers unfair, with 68% of Republicans and 64% of Democrats in agreement. Only 30% consider the current system fair, reflecting dissatisfaction with provider assignments based on location. This lack of choice limits customers' ability to secure better rates, impacting 23% of residents overall. Additionally, 20% express concern about rising energy costs, emphasizing the need for reforms to increase competition and empower consumer choice.

Widespread Perception of Unfairness in Energy Provider Policies

A striking 79% of District Two believe energy monopolies lack price incentives to keep prices down, with 80% of Republicans and 73% of Democrats in agreement. Furthermore, 84% say it's unfair that large industrial customers can choose their energy providers while residential customers cannot, underscoring widespread dissatisfaction with the current system.

Public Demands Conservative Free Market Principles to Enhance Competition, Transparency, and Lower Energy Costs

A substantial 81% of District Two find it unfair for monopoly companies like Entergy to force all customers to pay for green energy options. This includes 94% of Republicans and 61% of Democrats. In contrast, 81% support free market (6-in-10 Democrats) principles to increase competition and transparency, reflecting a strong desire for consumer-driven energy solutions.

Call for Diverse Options in Electric Providers

Support for Private Funding of Renewable Energy: Preference for Industry Investment Over Monopolized Purchasing

A significant 87% of residents support private investment in renewable energy plants, with backing from 83% of Democrats, 86% of Republicans, and 90% of Independents. 


